Dr. Zanaida Stewart Robles is an award-winning Black American female composer, vocalist, and teacher. She is a fierce advocate for diversity and inclusion in music education and performance. Authentic interpersonal connection and relationship-building are core principles of her teaching and performance methods. Born, raised, and educated in Southern California on the occupied lands of the Gabrielino-Tongva people, she is in demand as a composer, vocalist, clinician and adjudicator for competitions, festivals, and conferences related to choral and solo vocal music.

In this arrangement, Stewart Robles utilizes the original chant by Hildegard von Bingen – much beloved among YWC given its long history with founder Dr. Susan McMane. Each voice part takes up the melody at a different time, and the effect is entrancing as the listener gravitates from voice part to the next.

Biographies

The Young Women's Choral Projects of San Francisco transforms the lives of young women through exceptional artistry in choral performance, and brings the expressive power of their music to the community, the nation, and the world. Founded in 2012 by Dr. Susan McMane, and now led by Artistic Director Dr. Matthew Otto, YWCP includes six levels of choral experience for young women ages 4-18 from across the San Francisco Bay Area. Through YWCP, participants of richly diverse socio-ethnic backgrounds find their voices as singers, artists, and women in a nurturing environment that empowers them to achieve artistic and personal excellence.

Arietta Singers is YWCP's non-auditioned singing class for girls ages 6-8. This class emphasizes a foundation for healthy singing while engaging the whole child in fun, interactive musical learning. Using a Kodály-inspired curriculum, class members build basic musicianship skills and vocal technique while actively engaging their minds, bodies, and voices in folk songs and dances, music games, and unison choral music.

Prelude Chorus is YWCP's beginning level of choral training, for girls in grades 2-6. Through a Kodály-based music education curriculum, Prelude choristers learn healthy vocal production, music theory and performance expertise. Prelude Chorus sings repertoire in many styles, explores dances and games from around the world, and learns to sing beautifully in unison and two-part harmony.

Allegro Chorus is comprised of young women in grades 4-8. Members of the ensemble receive vocal and musical training through a Kodály-based curriculum that includes music theory, eartraining, sight-reading, vocal technique, and performance skills. Allegro Chorus sings a wide variety of music in many styles and languages and performs occasional bookings.

Vivo Chorus, the most advanced level of YWCP's training program, is for girls in grades 6-12. In Vivo Chorus, singers learn advanced sight-singing skills, and study complex music theory and ear training. Vivo choristers continue to develop their vocal skills to produce a free, strong, resonant voice, and occasionally have the opportunity for group and private voice lessons with a professional teacher within the rehearsal. They perform 4-6 times a year, and represent YWCP in outside bookings.

The Young Women's Chorus of San Francisco is the premier ensemble of the Young Women's Choral Projects. The Chorus comprises singers ages 12-18, and has been praised for its beauty of sound, stellar musicianship, and dynamic programming. Acclaimed in the *American Record Guide* for its "refined and beautifully controlled singing," the Young Women's Chorus has also won many competitive, national awards including the American Prize in Choral Performance, the Margaret

Hillis Award for Choral Excellence, the Dale Warland Singers Commission Award from Chorus America and American Composers Forum, and the ASCAP Adventurous Programming Award. Recent activities include a debut performance at Carnegie Hall in 2018; concert tours to South Africa (2019), France (2022), and Argentina (2023); the premiere of the opera *Abraham in Flames* in 2019; and performances with the London Philharmonia Orchestra and the San Francisco Symphony. Performing repertoire from early music to contemporary selections, the Chorus annually performs a professional series of concerts in the Bay Area, and commissions new works by leading composers.



Artistic Director Dr. Matthew Otto is an award-winning Canadian conductor, educator, and collaborator. From 2010-2023, he served on the faculty of the world-renowned Toronto Children's Chorus, including as Director of Education and Interim Artistic Director. In addition to conducting several ensembles, he oversaw their choral curriculum, educational outreach programs, and conductor apprentice program. In 2013, he co-founded the Toronto Youth Choir (TYC) to offer a space for innovation, inclusion, and musical excellence to youth and young adults ages 14-30. During his tenure, the TYC performed with The King's Singers, Irish

Youth Choir, Choir of Trinity College Melbourne, musica intima, Missouri State University Chorale, Toronto Mendelssohn Choir, and the Toronto Symphony Orchestra.

As a strong advocate for the choral arts in Canada, Matthew was President of Choirs Ontario, a board member of Choral Canada, and a founding member of Bridge Choral Collective. He has worked extensively as a guest conductor, lecturer, clinician, and adjudicator. In 2016, Matthew co-organized Chorus America's Choral Management Institute in Toronto and served on its faculty.

Matthew has led performances of Handel's Messiah, Mozart's Requiem, Mass in C Minor and Coronation Mass, Bach's St. John & St. Matthew Passions, and has prepared choruses for Helmuth Rilling, Peter Oundjian, Masaaki Suzuki, Donald Runnicles, Nicholas McGegan, Bramwell Tovey, and Rafael Frühbeck de Burgos. Passionate about music's role in Western liturgy, Matthew has served as music director at several Toronto churches, most recently Christ Church Deer Park. From 2020-2023, he was a lecturer in Choral Music Education at the University of Toronto and, in 2022, directed their Soprano-Alto Chamber Choir.

Matthew holds a Bachelor of Music in Composition, Master of Music in Conducting, and Ph.D. in Music Education. His doctoral dissertation is entitled "Let the Music Win!" Towards a Re-imagined Choral Pedagogy: A Phenomenological Case Study of Chorister Experience at the Toronto Children's Chorus, and traces the impact of high-level choral singing on youth.



Associate Artistic Director and Allegro Chorus, Arietta Singers, and Dolce Singers Director Samantha Maas-Baldwin has been teaching music in the Bay Area for over 10 years. After graduating from San Francisco State University with a Bachelor of Music in Music Education with an emphasis in classical voice, Samantha earned her California Teaching Credential and became the director of music at San Marin High School in northern Marin, leading many choral and instrumental ensembles. In the spring of 2014, Samantha earned a Master of Music in Music Education with Kodály Emphasis from Holy Names

University. While earning her Master's, Samantha also studied advanced vocal pedagogy with Eric Howe.

As an elementary and middle school music educator and Kodály specialist, Samantha has worked as a general music teacher and choir director for children's choirs and public schools in the North and East Bay.

Vivo Chorus Director Gemma Arguelles celebrates over thirty years of service as a music educator and choir director in Bay Area institutions and in the Philippines. She serves as adjunct music lecturer at the renowned Kodály Center at Holy Names University in Oakland, and currently teaches PreK- 4 music and directs the elementary choruses at The Nueva School in Hillsborough. Recognized for her long career of excellence in teaching and service to music education, Gemma was honored with the 2017 Organization of American Kodály Educators (OAKE) Outstanding Educator award. She is a frequent present



Kodály Educators (OAKE) Outstanding Educator award. She is a frequent presenter at local and national professional conferences and has led workshops for music organizations including OAKE, ACDA, NAfME and professional music organizations in the Philippines.

Gemma earned her Master's degree in Music Education with Kodály Emphasis from Holy Names University and Bachelor's degrees in Music Education and Choral Conducting from the University of the Philippines. She has completed all course work for PhD in Music Education at the University of Oklahoma.



Prelude Chorus Director Katie Jenks recently began teaching in the Oakland Unified School District with TK-5th graders. With an undergraduate degree in Music Education from New York University, she received her master's degree in Music Education with Kodály Emphasis from Holy Names University in 2020 and her credential from San Francisco State University in 2021. She is originally from the East Coast and grew up as a member of Fairfield County Children's Choir in Connecticut.



Young Women's Chorus Assistant Conductor Sian Wittke has a degree in Music Education with an emphasis on Choral Conducting from Berklee College of Music. Sian began teaching music in Boston in 2014 and was the choral director at Orchard Gardens School for two years before moving back to the Bay Area. She has worked with the Boston Children's Chorus as well as the Oakland Youth Chorus, and was YWCP's Choral Fellow in the 2017-18 season. Sian was the music director at San Francisco's Adda Clevenger School for the past four years, and now teaches at Hamlin School.

Pianist Dr. Margaret Halbig moved to the Bay Area in 2011 and joined the accompanying and vocal coaching staff at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. An advocate of new and contemporary music, Margaret has been the pianist for the New Music Collective, Wild Rumpus, since its inception in 2011. Margaret is also the pianist for Frequency 49, a wind and piano chamber ensemble exploring the interdependent relationship between color and sound unique to this combination of instruments. In summer 2016, Margaret joined the faculty of the Bay Area Vocal Academy, providing comprehensive vocal training to young singers, as coach and pianist.



Margaret earned her DMA from the University of California, Santa Barbara, under the tutelage of Robert Koenig and also holds performance degrees from the University of Missouri, Kansas City Conservatory, and University of Evansville, Indiana. Her primary teachers include Jonathan Feldman, Robert Weirich, and Anne Fiedler.



Pianist Jefferson Packer has been active as a collaborative pianist and baritone since moving to San Francisco over two decades ago. As the bass soloist at Calvary Presbyterian Church, he leads sectionals from the keyboard in addition to his singing duties. He was a staff accompanist at Santa Clara University, and has done accompaniment work for the San Francisco Symphony, Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra, and Pocket Opera, as well as multiple recitals with singers and instrumentalists. He holds a Master's Degree in Piano Performance from San

Francisco State University, where he was a student of William Corbett Jones. He has also studied voice privately for over fifteen years, and is currently studying with Dr. Julia Nielsen.



Bradley Christensen enjoys a busy multi-faceted career as a baritone, voice teacher, and guest clinician, and has continued to earn praise for his "most well-rounded instrument ... focused, rich, and sympathetically communicative" (Natasha Gauthier, *Ottawa Citizen*). He holds four degrees: a BMUS (Hons) in Vocal Performance and a BA in Italian, both from the University of Auckland, and a MMus and a DMA in Voice Performance and Pedagogy from the University of Toronto. In 2016, he was invited by The Royal Conservatory of Toronto to hold one of seven positions in its prestigious Rebanks Family Fellowship and

International Performance Residency Program. He also furthered his development as a young artist with Opera on the Avalon, Highlands Opera Studio, and Opera North.

Bradley has had the pleasure of working with many arts organizations across Canada and internationally through the realms of opera, operetta, oratorio, chamber music, song recitals, and musical theater. Recent performance highlights include appearances with: Canadian Opera Company Concert Series; Cultureland Opera Collective; Confluence Concerts; Choral Connection; Bach Elgar Choir; New Opera Lyra; as well as a performance in Auckland, New Zealand, of Brahms' song cycle "Die schöne Magelone," staged by Aria Umezawa. Bradley made his US debut in 2017 performing the role of Agamemnon with Opera North in Offenbach's *La belle Hélène*, while also covering the role of Fred/Petruccio in Cole Porter's *Kiss me, Kate*.

Awards include the Sondra Radvanovsky scholarship, awarded by the International Resource Centre for Performing Artists as one of 10 'Singing Stars: The Next Generation,' the Pears-Britten singing scholarship (University of Auckland), the Marie D'Albini scholarship in singing (University of Auckland), and a traveling scholarship to study in Italy in 2007 (University of Auckland). Bradley has also been a top 10 finalist in the New Zealand Aria Competition, the LEXUS Song Quest and the Rochester International Voice Competition.

Violinist Melissa Kleinbart, occupant of the Katharine Hanrahan Chair of the San Francisco Symphony, joined the Symphony in 1998 after serving as associate concertmaster with the San Francisco Opera orchestra and assistant concertmaster with the Vancouver Symphony. In addition to solo appearances with the Philadelphia Orchestra, Vancouver Symphony, and New York Symphonic Ensemble, Melissa has been a participant at the Marlboro and Tanglewood music festivals and has performed with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. While at Tanglewood she served as concertmaster



under Leonard Bernstein and Seiji Ozawa, subsequently receiving the Pierre Mayer award as an Outstanding Violinist. A graduate of the Juilliard School, she performs and teaches with the San Francisco Academy Orchestra.

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
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
